The Botetourt County 4-H Horse and Pony Club members are a diverse group – boys and girls, different backgrounds, various ages, and horse owners as well as non-owners with one great common interest - - - **a love of horses and a desire to know more about them.** The club was organized in 1986 for this reason, to provide the youth of Botetourt County with the opportunities to learn about and have fun with horses.

WHO CAN JOIN?

The Club is open to any young person between the ages of 5 and 19 as of September 30th of the current year. Any young person with an interest in horses, who wants to learn more and be with others with similar interests may join. Not all club members are experienced riders; many do not own their horses.

WHAT DO WE DO?

Monthly 4-H Club meetings

- Elect officers
- Conduct club business
- Educational programs & speakers
- Plan activities, field trips, clinics, etc.

Horse related field trips and clinics offer basic information and "hands on" training.

All members enroll in at least one 4-H project book and are encouraged to complete it as a way to learn more about horses, as well as a means of recording 4-H activities for the year.

Members are encouraged to participate in 4-H activities such as the Horseless Horse Show, 4-H Presentation Contest, Horse Shows, Team competitions, 4-H Camp and other 4-H activities. The biggest club activity of the year is the club horse show. All members, whether they own a horse or not, have the chance to be

in this show in which families get together for a picnic lunch and lots of fun.

Members participate in community service projects. Recent projects have included benefiting cancer research through the Relay for Life, raising money for both the Vinton Equine Rescue Center and the League for Animal Protection, and helping at the Roanoke Valley Horse Show.

ANY THING ELSE?

Competition teams for Horse Judging and Hippology also comes from the ranks of the club.

4-H Horse Judging teaches youth to:

- Evaluate horses on the basis of conformation and performance
- Understand the basic relationship between a horse's body structure and its performance
- Make consistent, logical decisions
- Orally defend their placing of the class by presenting oral reasons to a judge
- Work together as a team

4-H Hippology teaches youth to:

- Learn horse science – everything about the horse from nutrition to anatomy and physiology to proper barn construction
- Learn to identify different feeds, tack and horse breeds and about the horse industry
- Work together as a team

District, Regional, State and National competitions are available for both Horse Judging and Hippology. Both Horse Judging and Hippology Teams work hard and face stiff competition but they enjoy the travel and the comradeship gained by working together.
